

BRIGHT AS THE RISING SUN: EMPEROR MEIJI AND THE MAKING OF MODERN JAPAN, 1853

Following the fall of the Tokugawa Shogunate and the restoration of the monarchy in 1867, Emperor Meiji transformed Japan from a feudal and isolated nation off the coast of China into an industrial powerhouse projecting its power ever farther from its borders. This committee tracks how in just four short decades, Japan went from being humiliated by the incursions of Western colonial powers to besting one on the field of battle, cementing Japan as a peer competitor in Asia, and one to rival even the staid empires of old.

Delegates will experience the heady days of rebellion against the new Imperial rule, the development of industrialization and the Westernization of the country, and even Japan's expansion as it attempts to compete with the Western colonial powers slowly encircling the rest of Asia. Moreover, the substantial technological and political revolution encompassing all aspects of Japanese life offers substantial inflection points for committee movement. In a time of such dynamism, anything committee does can change the course of history. Fundamentally, delegates will play a leading role in the development both in the development of Japan as a state and as a nation.
