

PU COYLC QMT (CYC)DLBC: VENONA PROJECT, 1945

Soviets and ciphers and substitutions! Oh my! The Venona project, initiated in 1943 as a counterintelligence group under the US Army's Signal Intelligence Service (SIS), was born from the uneasy alliance between the United States and the Soviet Union. US-Soviet relations had been strained long before World War II, but the high stakes of the war forced US leadership to acknowledge that they did not trust Joseph Stalin not to betray the allied forces. The US desperately needed to up their intelligence game, especially given the volatile nature of the newly-formed Manhattan project. The women (and occasional men) of the Venona project worked secretly to intercept and decipher their ally's communications, revealing the presence of multiple Soviet spy rings in the US and tracing them back to a targeted Soviet espionage campaign. However, the necessity of a US-Soviet alliance forced diplomatic tensions to the back burner.

Now, in 1945, the European theater is closed. US-Soviet relations are worsening by the minute as the US expands its influence in Europe and the Soviets neglect to send aid to US troops in the pacific. Out of necessity, the Venona project remains highly classified—not even President Truman knows it exists. However, this means that information gathered by the project can seem suspect to US officials, and often cannot be presented outright. As conflict between the US and the USSR escalates, the work of the Venona project has never been more vital; however, a vast majority of project members will be forced to confront the fact that once the war ends they will be expected to vacate their positions and return to the sphere of domesticity. Additionally, the threat of government infiltration looms as the US begins expanding its investments in military technology and brings many new employees into the fold.

Will the project be able to successfully stop Soviet intelligence efforts from its position within a tightly wound bureaucracy? How will the women of the Venona project balance their duties as public servants with the large pushback against women's workplace rights? Should

the project expand, and, if so, what is the right balance between secrecy and exposure when working with other intelligence agencies? These are the questions this committee will need to address as we explore this exciting overlap of Washington bureaucracy, espionage, and gender dynamics. Welcome to the Veno(n)a Project, 1945.
